

A Moment With . . . B. D. Owens

In this interview with B. D. Owens, I discovered many interesting aspects of B. D. Owens and his opinions. I found him to be very different from what most people think. He is actually an intelligent and easy person to talk to. He seemed to be willing to answer my questions, although he avoided direct answers to a few questions. The following are some important excerpts from our conversation.

Question—Is the tuition going up next year? B. D. "Yes, it is . . . it will go up 75 dollars per semester" (which is still less than most private universities in Florida).

What will the money be used for? ".... Part of it will go for faculty salary increases which we have to do to maintain our faculty . . . improvements in the university . . . up grading of student services . . . the biggest part will go for inflationary costs." "We work on a 6 million dollar budget."

B. D. What's your reaction to 300 students leaving? "I don't have any basic reaction . . . at the same time there are 300 students leaving, there are about that many students coming in . . . its normal for the spring semester.

Why do you think people transfer from the University? B. D. "Girlfriends, nearness to home, a whole host of different reasons not related to the institution. . . . They wind up transfering back in a year later or a semester later.'

Effects Of Budget On UT Education

In operation of the university, UT's budget has reached \$600,299,702 for the current year, with an additional \$225,000 expected before the year ends.

Since the majority of these fees come from the students, it would be interesting to note what the money is used for, what other sources are available and what functions are incorporated in the additional fees.

According to Mr. Sliz, Vice President of Business Affairs, these funds are spent mainly in these major categories:

- Instruction and departmental research,
- Operation and maintenance of the physical plant,
- Athletics,
- Dormitories,
- Student services
- Student aid General admission and institutional expenses.

What was your reaction to last December's "Riot"? "It wasn't a riot. What started out to be a fun pantyraid . . . the leadership of that was taken over by some other people, really out of the control of those who organized the panty raid and it degenerated into something that was not conducive to an academic climate." What was done about that? B. D. "there were several students who were put on diciplinary probation, some students were denied readmission . . . and some were reprimanded by the deans."

Do you think there is any chance for twenty-four hour visitation? B. D. "I don't know, I haven't seen any proposals which would indicate this is consistant with an academic learning community and would benefit the academic learning environment. The "panty-raid" . . . probably set open visitation back a great deal. "I'm not certain that all of our students want 24 hour

Do you agree with 24 hour visitation? B. D. "No" . . . I'm going to see what's recommended by the dean" (as far as limitations).

What is your opinion of the hot line? B. D. "The hot line was well intended, but circumstances like that, so many times people won't use it."

What is your opinion of the legalization of marijuana? B. D. "I'm opposed to it . . . I don't think we have enough evidence concerning the effects of marijuana. There are too many cases where marijuana leads on to other kinds of drug habits. I don't really feel that we have enough information and scientific data to show one way or the other.

During 1971-1972 student fees contributed to 61.7% of UT's income.

However, Mr. Sliz stated that, "Other main income sources were the dormitories (7.8%), intercollegiate athletics (9.7%) and the Student Union (9.4%).

Survey Shows Upturn In Job Market For This Year's Graduates

A survey of companies and government agencies that expect to hire college graduates this year indicates that now, not sometime after graduation in June, is when seniors should be starting to look for jobs.

The survey, conducted by Changing Times magazine and released February 1, shows that despite an upturn in the job market for new graduates, the day when they could wait for corporate recruiters to come to them is still just a memory.

Replies from more than 100 companies indicate that seniors who do get started early should find good demand for their services in most major disciplines. Personnel officers responding to the survey described a wide range of jobs throughout the country.

72 of the organizations have or expect to have jobs for new engineering graduates. The specialties needed include aeronautical, chemical, civil, electrical, geological, industrial and mechanical engineering, among others.

59 want business and marketing majors for jobs in sales, management, planning and other

- 48 have varied openings for accountants.
- 40 want science or mathematics majors for research, development and other technical positions.
- 30 have jobs for liberal arts majors in a variety of fields.
- 22 say they're looking for graduates with such miscellaneous specialties as computer programming, graphic arts, health, communications, advertising.

The closer an applicant's record and goals match the company's needs, the more likely he or she is to get the job.

Who is the ideal candidate? A composite picture drawn from the comments of personnel officers who participated in the survey shows a graduate with these shining characteristics:

Good grades. Companies still put a premium

Plenty of extracurricular activities. Participation in campus affairs demonstrates an ability to get along with others.

Work experience. Ideally, this means summer or part-time work in a field related to the one you want to enter.

Willingness to relocate. Companies try to assign workers where they're needed most. An

Is there anyway that you can help solve the difference between the groups? It's a hard question to answer, for if a answer could be found, it would be a small step towards friendship and peace.

It's funny at the Retreat you can see members from the different groups buying each other beers, but on campus hate each other.

Why couldn't we stop hating each other and try to understand each others viewpoints.

Coming Event



Professor Apple





Macbeth Is In Town

Macbeth, William Shakespeare's devastatingly powerful drama of twelfth century royal intrigue and murder, opened this Wednesday at the University of Tampa Falk Theatre. The lavishly staged production is the second offering of the year by the drama department following last semester's successful run of the Moliere classic The Doctor in Spite of Himself.

The play is the intricately woven chronicle of a heroic Scotsman. A noble Thane who is twisted and bent by the supernatural solicitings of three hideous witches and an overpowering wife into a cursed, despised and emotionally ravished King, the shell of what was once a proud and good man. A complete castle facade has been constructed on stage for the enhancement of realism, and the costuming is both historically accurate and extravagant.

Macbeth is directed by Drama department head Vincent Petti and features sophomore Don Marinelli in the title role of Macbeth. His striking and beautiful Lady Macbeth is portrayed by junior Marna Dillane. R. J. Miller is cast in the role of Banquo, the ill-fated companion of Macbeth who later appears as a ghost. Mike Skaletsky is featured as Macduff with Bill Knopke as King Duncan and the Porter. Bob Abrams portrays Ross and Mike Bernstein plays Seyton, the loyal servant of Macbeth. Others in the cast are Richard Handrahan, David Bruss, Milt Byrd, Danny Evangelista, Rick Schlegelmilch and Meg Maloney, Mona Levine and Donna Blackstone are cast as the three witches.

Modified Food Plan

As an extra incentive for students, faculty and staff members to utilize campus facilities, the business office has offered a modified food plan.

The commuter has a choice of Plan A, consisting of 15 meals per week in the cafeteria Monday through Friday, costing \$245.25 or Plan B consisting of 10 meals per week, Monday through Friday for \$201.00. From January 29 until May 18, these plans will be in effect, thus being comprised of 15

However, the commuter can take advantage of the program at any time and the price will be prorated from the week he begins, but he must start on a Monday.

Those using the food plan will receive meal tickets as the resident students do.

Breakfast ranges from 7:00 a.m. until 9:00 a.m., lunch from 11:00 a.m. until 1:45 p.m. and dinner from 4:30 p.m. until 6:30 p.m.

By taking advantage of the modified food plan, the student, faculty or staff member who spends the majority of his time on campus does not have to leave campus for his meals.

Also, those using this plan will probably save money because they can eat as much as they want.

Since the majority of UT students find more exciting things to do on Saturday and Sunday than to stay around campus, the program excludes weekends.

All in all, this food plan is a convenience factor, as well as economical. Kim Clark

The State Fair will commence this year at 8 a.m. on February 6, 1973 through February 17, 1973 inclusive. The policy established for parking on the University campus is as follows.

The University premises will be, in effect, sealed from 7:30 a.m. until 6 p.m. by having Security personnel checking traffic at all entrances to the University. They will permit entry only to those vehicles displaying a University parking permit.

Sale of parking places will commence on a limited basis at 6 p.m. where space exists in the staff lot and outer student lots around Howell and Delo Hall. At 8 p.m.


Under The Cover And Between The Sheets

Elton John, in the grand style of the 50's has released a new album, Don't Shoot Me, I'm Only the Piano Player. The record contains a few easy songs, but mostly it is made-up of an elite type rock and roll formed by the fusion of Elton's music with lyricist Bernie Zaupin's images as the stimulus. Elton also seems to be phrasing like Leon Russell (listen to "Have Mercy on the Criminal"). Madman Across the Water was the end of his period of piano, bass, drums, and strings; on Honky Chateau he added Davey Johnson (playing guitars, mandolin and sitar) and came up with a rock band with no strings; with Don't Shoot Me he has returned to strings, but used them sparingly to keep the orchestration simple.

For instance, "Hard Time Losin' Man" has a classic—"He sold me a dime of some super-fine/Dynamite from Mexico/I spent all that night/just trying to get right/on an ounce of oregano."

Croce, a pseudo-Southern from Philadelphia, looks more like what, you'd expect to see flipping dough in a pizzaria than the owner of a clean 16-year old voice.
