"A student sometimes feels alienated on a campus. A shy student may feel that a certain group runs everything. That there is no place for him.

Happy Jack's Supper Club is a way by which the SPC is trying to show students that they are all members of the same campus family, and that we all have a place and a service that we can provide for the campus community," said Jack Spirtos the Club's Master of Ceremonies.

Spirtos, known by many as "That Frizzy-Haired Greek," also serves the university as assistant Editor of The Minaret, is involved in the Student Government Association and spent two years in the UT Drama Department under the direction of Vince Petti.

"Students must have a way of finding out what is happening on campus with Happy Jack's, we make sure a good percentage of the campus is made aware of campus activities," said Barry Lydon, President of the Student Program Council, "we don't want to hear students saying, 'I didn't know about that.'"

All organizations, Greeks, and other student groups can give the "Club" their own public announcements. All announcements are asked to be typed in upper case lettering

and given to Ralph Rosenblatt at 4:30 p.m. on show dates or dropped off earlier in his box in the SPC box in room one of the Union.

The music ranges from "Capt. Copter and the Twirlybirds" to the subtle tones of "Seals and Crofts." An added attraction is "make it, or break it" where Happy Jack plays new forty-fives for the approval of the club members.

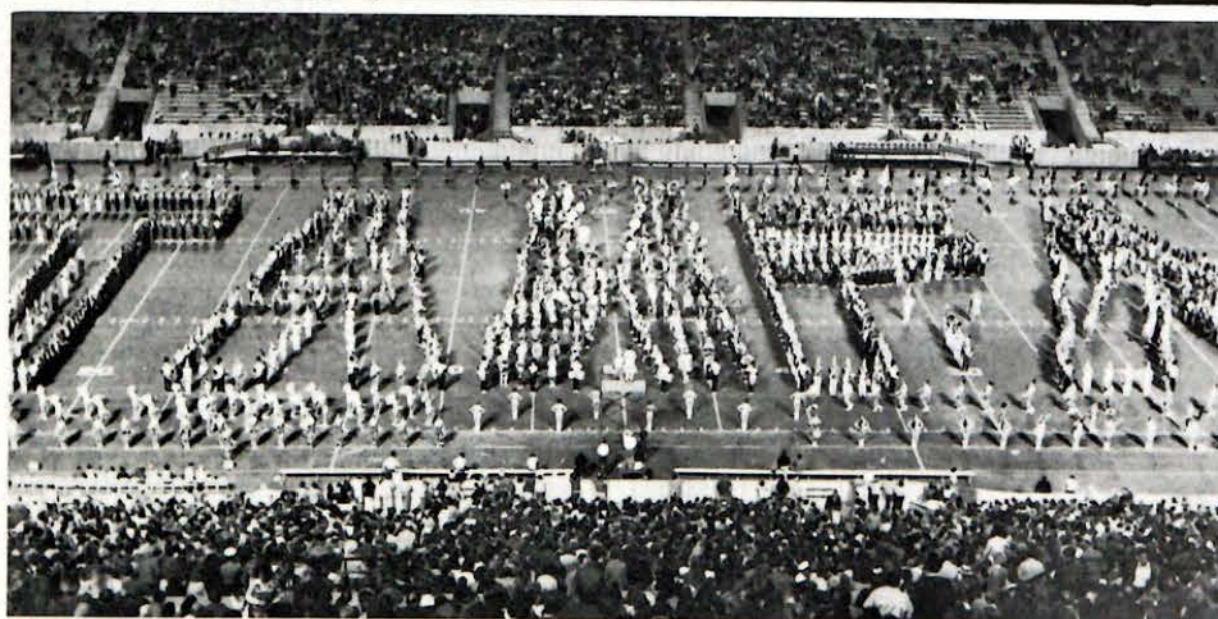
Rosenblatt explained, "what we try to do, is make dinner a party with everyone involved. If we can goof together we can work together. All we want to do is get everyone together."

Presenting a rather light agenda, the SGA House of Representatives held a short meeting Oct. 18, again featuring their new organizational format that has made these meetings both efficient and worthwhile.

Dr. Fisher offered the student body a new type of volunteer program that features working with juvenile delinquents that are on probation. Fisher asked that the representatives solicit their organizations for support.

Butch Heiles, SGA president speaking for a student, asked that a water fountain and soda machine be installed at the UT pool. Cost of such a project would be \$200-400.

The junior senators reported that they are "to evaluate security, the business office and things like that."

They plan to set up desks and poles to find out exactly how the students think.

The freshman senators are currently studying the health center and plan to send out questionnaires to determine student opinion.

Discussion arose on the floor in regards to the SGA budget and book-keeping. SGA treasurer, Kathy Colleary, was not present, but will make a report at the next meeting.

Jim Lucas asked about revenue sharing. "If in fact, as has been inferred the SGA has excess funds, we should consider revenue sharing. The SGA could allocate funds for each organization in SGA to use for their individual projects."

A representative of the Delo Hall Association discussed sponsoring a dance to raise money for the two students that were injured in a motorcycle accident. Their hospital costs keep rising. The representative was requested to do further research and to propose a motion at the next meeting.

Gayle Rzepski, our treasurer, is an active member of Zeta Tau Alpha. She is a speech pathology major and is a member of the American Speech Association.

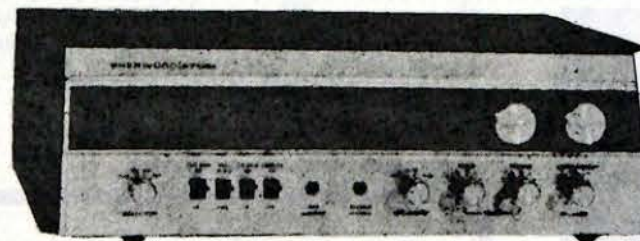
## Blood Bank

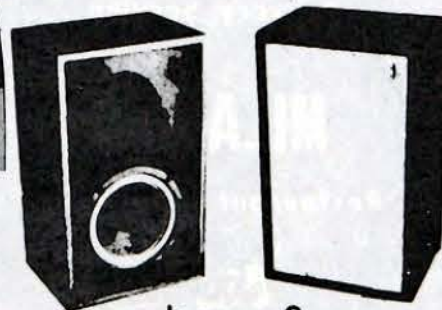

## Speech Pathology

The National Student Speech and Hearing Association have guest speakers from the areas in speech pathology speak at their NSSHA meeting on various topics which pertain to their field.

Major Rooney from Tampa General Hospital and Mr. Pete Halpin; Barbara Capitano, Helen Chandler and Ann Hendricks from the United Cerebral Palsy Center. Major Rooney gave extremely enlightening talks on the rehabilitation of laryngectomized patients. He had undergone a laryngectomy some years ago and developed his own technique for producing esophageal speech (speech without a larynx).

He now teaches this technique to laryngectomy patients at the Curtis Hixon Rehabilitation Center in Tampa General Hospital. The other speakers from the United Cerebral Palsy Center conducted a panel discussion complete with slides related to the cerebral palsied child. The panel consisted of Ann Hendricks, social worker; Helen Chandler, developmental pre-school; Barbara Capitano, physical therapist; and Pete Halpin, who is executive director.

With the continuations of these programs the National Student Speech and Hearing Association hopes to give students majoring in speech pathology insight into the practical applications of various techniques of speech therapy learned in the classroom now being used in actual job settings.

## Look Us Over

In March 1974, Tampa U. will have very important visitors from the Southern Association of Colleges and schools (S.A.C.S.). Before this examination, concerning accreditation, Dr. Covington and Dean Hyde have organized a series of faculty committees working on a self-study of various departments. This self-study report is due a year before the SACS visits the campus itself.

The university is fully accredited every ten years by the Association, giving us recognition as a competent, independent institution in regards to their standards of education.

The process of accreditation encompasses numerous aspects of education and college life. The ratio of Doctorate degrees on the faculty, the library as a facility, the physical facilities of the school as a whole, the ability to plan for the future, the resource management (financial and total operation of the university), the atmosphere of learning, the curriculum, our ability to change and progress, and even student personal progress—all these factors are considered in the inspection.

Dr. Mendelsohn, Vice-President of Academic Affairs, explains that this accreditation is not a competitive race with other schools. It is instead a view of ourselves as a developing unit making progress to benefit the individual person and university. UT is in no danger of losing full accreditation, so let's concentrate on making it the No. 1 small college in the South all-around.

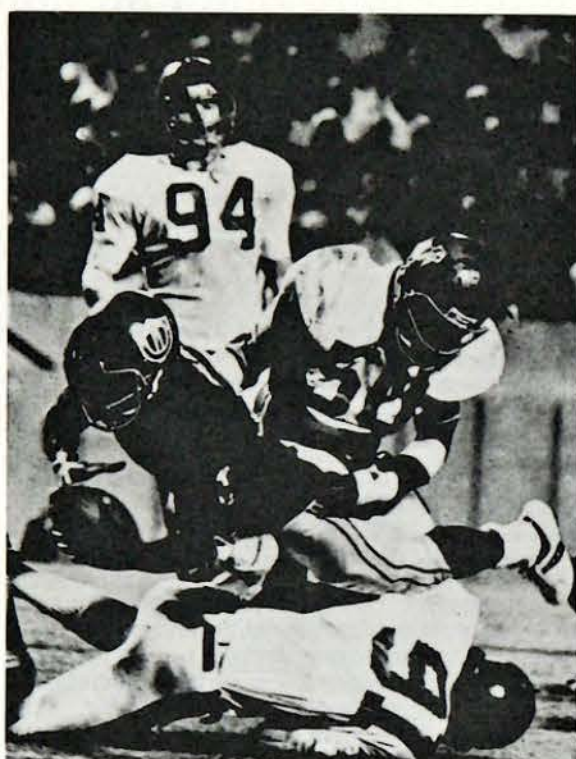

A new shell and set of oars has been purchased for the crew competition this year, athletic director Gus Dielens told me.

When the university's new building is completed at Philips Field, plans are to change the old training room into a guest house for visiting crew teams.

"It's easier to get some of the recognized schools on the schedule when food and lodging facilities are available," Dielens said.

Plans in upgrading the sport include encouragement of New England area and Ivy League teams to visit and row here.

A January start is expected for intercollegiate competition.

## Spartans Do The Job: Spartans 24 - Bulldogs 7

Improving the passing game is the main objective of University of Tampa head football coach Earle Bruce and his staff this week after the Spartans posted an impressive 24-7 come-from-behind victory over Drake last Saturday.

"We need a break right now," Bruce said. "The kids have been working hard since the start of two-a-day practices and deserve some sort of rest. It will also give us time to get all of our injured players ready."

Bruce was beaming after the Drake contest where the Spartans trailed 7-0 at halftime after the Bulldogs scored on a 59-yard punt return by Doug Winslow.

"The kids really came back in the third and fourth quarters," Bruce said. "It was probably the best half of football we've played so far this season. Until we got going in the second half I was starting to doubt our offense."

The Drake contest did create one problem for Bruce. He's once again faced with the dilemma of picking between Buddy Carter and Fred Solomon as his starting quarterback. Carter received the nod after the Louisville game and started against Southern Illinois and Drake.

But Solomon came off the bench last Saturday to score two touchdowns in the second half and direct the Spartans on their third TD march. He totaled 88 yards in 15 rushing carries.

"I think everyone should understand that I'm not disenchanted with Buddy Carter. He moved the team well against Drake, but we couldn't put the ball in the end zone."

The Spartan defensive unit continues to draw praise from the coaching staff.

"They really have pride in their work," Bruce said of the defensive unit. "Those kids are just doing a fantastic job. They know that for us to win they must work well together."

"Our offense scored the points Saturday, but the defense had a lot to do with it. They

were always turning the ball over to the offense in good field position."

The defense limited Drake to just seven yards rushing and 116 through the air to lower defensive averages that were already impressive. In seven games, the Spartans have yielded just 76 points, and 217.2 total yards per game. The foes are gaining 123.8 on the ground and 93.4 through the air.

"That's impressive now and I hope it's the same five weeks from now," Bruce said. "If it is we'll have had a successful season."

The A&M game begins what Bruce terms "the most grueling part of our schedule." Following A&M, Tampa entertains Miami (Nov. 11), Bowling Green (Nov. 18) and Vanderbilt (Nov. 25). The Miami game will be Homecoming for the Spartans with a 7 p.m. kickoff.

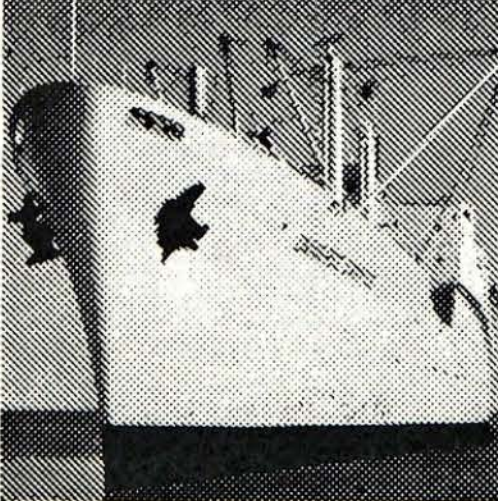
