FIRE SAFETY
Since the Delo Hall fire, some
concern has been expressed by
students concerning the safety
of the converted hotel. During
an interview with the Tampa
Fire Commissioner and the
Tampa Building Commissioner,
Delo Hall was said to be safe
according to the minimum build-
ing code of the City of Tampa.
There are two metal stair-
wells with fire doors on each
floor. It was also pointed out
that the building had passed
inspection when it was the Em-
bassy Hotel and that many im-
provements have been made
since then.
The office of States Attorney
Paul Antinori, was also con-
tacted with regard to fire safety
in Delo Hall. Mr. Antinorit is
heading a committee to inventi-
gate the Fire Commission and
could not conment on Delo Hall,
since his investigation does not
cover specific buildings.
