Tampa To Get \$125,000 From Federal Government

The University of Tampa has been awarded a \$125,000 National Defense student loan fund for the 1964-65 academic year.

Authorized by the National Defense Education Act of 1958, the student loan program is designed to insure trained manpower of sufficient quality and quantity to meet the national defense needs of the United States. It provides for the creation of loan funds at American colleges from which needy students may borrow on reasonable terms for the purpose of completing their higher education.

The federal loan will provide \$62,500 per semester for student loans at the University of Tampa, with freshmen to be allocated \$12,500 and upperclassmen, \$50,000 of that amount. A student will be allowed to borrow up to \$1,000 a year and not more than \$5,000 during his entire college course. In order to be eligible for such a loan, an applicant must be a current full-time student at the University or have been accepted for admission.

The University is required to contribute to the loan fund a sum equal to at least one-ninth of the amount contributed by the Federal Government. The University will select the student recipients on the basis of financial need and capability of maintaining good standing in their courses. Under the law, special consideration will be given to students with a superior academic background who wish to

teach in elementary or secondary schools or who indicate a superiority in science, mathematics, engineering or a modern foreign language.

Repayment of the loans with 3 per cent annual interest begins one year after the student completes

Kendrick Receives "Wall Street Journal" Award

University of Tampa business administration senior William J. Kendrick has been singled out for honors by one of the nation's top-ranked business publications.

Kendrick, of 3405 Carrington St., Tampa, was notified by officials of the "Wall Street Journal" that he has been named to receive that newspaper's 1964 Student Achievement Award at the University.

Son of Mr. and Mrs. Jay P. Kendrick of Tampa, Kendrick will receive his Bachelor of Science degree in Business Administration from the University June 7.

The "Wall Street Journal" award consists of a large silver medallion and a year's subscription to the newspaper. It is made on the basis of scholarship and campus activities. In addition, Kendrick's name will be inscribed on a permanent plaque in the lounge of the University's Administration building.

Student Congress President John Hines and Dean Michael A. DeCarlo won key positions in the Southern Universities Student Government Association during the latter's Eleventh Annual Conference at Biloxi, Mississippi on May 7, 8, 9.

John Hines was elected as Chairman of SUSGA by 54 of the 62 southern universities from the eight states Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, S. Carolina, Tennessee and Kentucky. Hines served as Vice Chairman for the State of Florida during the past year.

Dean DeCarlo was elected to the four member SUSGA Advisory Board. One of these positions becomes vacant each year and a new member is elected by all the member schools. This was Dean DeCarlo's first attendance at a SUSGA conference. Other members of the Board include Mr. James Dull, Dean of Students, Georgia Institute of Technology, Miss Katherine Cater, Dean of Women, Auburn University, and Dr. J. R. Sitzler, Dean of Students, University of Southern Mississippi.

The University of Tampa delegation, the third largest in attendance, also included, George Watson, Carolyn Showers, Janet Parker, Yvette Forman, Gail Fischer, Dell

Davis, George Murphy, Deno Katrumbos, Jack Doherty, Dick Perrier, and Steve Corrao. The delegation was considered the most popular at the conference and gained the admiration and friendship of the member schools.

SUSGA exists "as a link of communication between the colleges and universities in the southeast, enabling the student leaders to exchange ideas and experiences in order to benefit one another in their role of service and leadership

to their respective student bodies. It provides a means for cooperation among the various institutions for the mutual benefit of each. It does not in any way assume the role of a supervisory organization nor as a representative organization that can speak for the students it serves. It is a non-policy making and non-legislative organization that exists solely to serve the students of the southeast and to assist student

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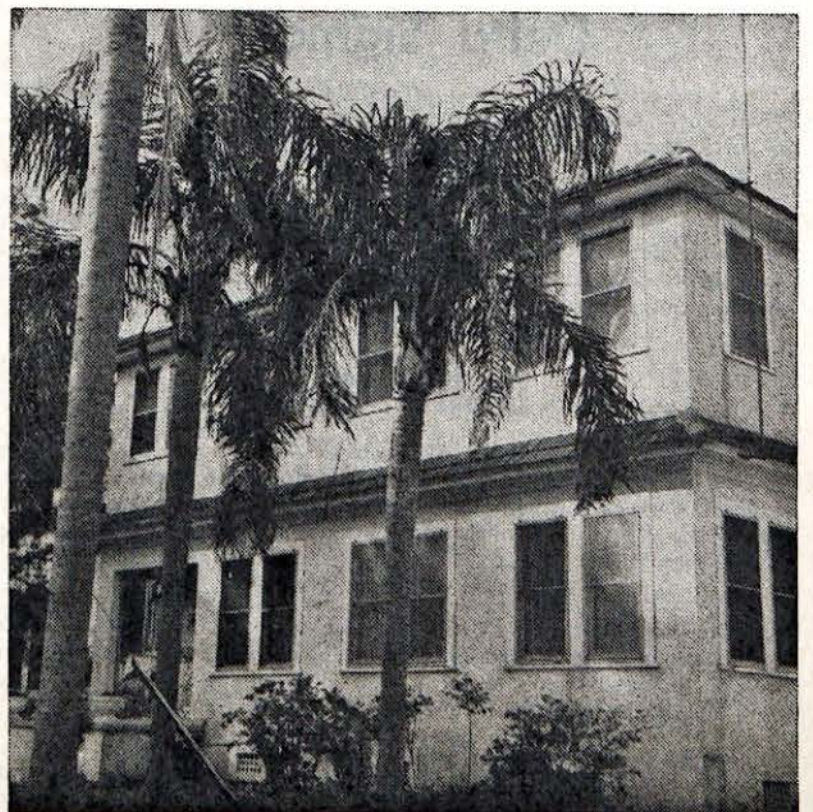
TEP's Get New House At 203 Verne Street

EDITORIAL COMMUNICATION BREAKDOWN

This coming Tuesday night the Minaret is sponsoring the University of Tampa's first Leadership Conference, to help to explore ways of improving communications between the now widely divided sectors of the university.

The communications breakdown is a real and unhealthy condition, one which continues to grow and thrive despite improvement in many other areas of the university. The Minaret, being the official central news agency of the university, has, at various times, worked with every administrative office, most faculty members, and via its representation on Student Congress, with responsible student leaders. We thus feel that we are in a position to make a qualified and valid evaluation on the existing state of campus communications.

We find duplication of material, poor distribution of information, failure of students to keep themselves informed of rules and regulations by reading available handbooks and catalogues, failure of faculty members to inform the news media of their activities and to make themselves readily available, and lastly failure of administrative officials to clearly explain the reasoning behind many official rules and regulations to the student body.

Every sector of the university has acknowledged these shortcomings, but few opportunities to meet with other sectors to effect solutions, to the problems, have been made available. The leadership conference will place administrators, faculty members, and students together on the controlling panel of the conference. Here, a free flow of opinion should prevail, in the open, in front of delegates representing the majority of the student body.

The leadership conference thus, if there is adequate participation, will act as a first step in the elimination of the communications breakdown.

leaders of its member institutions to better serve their own student bodies. Since SUSGA exists for service only and does not attempt to supervise or represent its members in any way, the organizational structure of SUSGA exists only to coordinate and plan the activities that are carried out as a service to member schools."

SUSGA services to member schools include:

1. A central office is provided as a co-ordinating service for the Association.
2. The central office provides a list of member schools with the name of the student body president, student government advisors, and editors of publications.
3. The Association sponsors an annual Publications Workshop for the yearbook, newspaper, and magazine personnel.
4. The Annual Conference is one of the most important activities of SUSGA. This conference serves as a common meeting point for student leaders from schools throughout the southeast. It is conducted as a workshop for student government. Outstanding speakers and panelists stimulate discussion among student leaders from various areas of student activity.
5. The Association offers the services of its research center. Member schools may request that research be done on any area of student government. The results are tabulated and given to the school without cost.
6. Schools are encouraged to increase their effectiveness of continuity by compiling an annual report and sharing them with other member schools.
7. SUSGA publishes a directory of member schools containing statistical information of each school's operation, organization, and administration of student government.
8. SUSGA sponsors an Entertainment Bureau in cooperation with International Talent Associates in New York City, as well as other agencies.
9. The Association sponsors a sportsmanship clinic for cheerleaders, spirit committee chairman, and other interested people.
10. SUSGA offers the services of a Consultant Team to help newly-formed student governments as well as the re-organization or re-evaluation of a present system. This service must be requested by the member school.

Summer Session Starts June 15

The University of Tampa's 1964 summer session will begin June 15 and run through August 6, it was announced today by Dr. Willis J. Dunn, director of admissions and registrar.

Registration of currently enrolled students will be from 8 a.m. until 4 p.m. June 11 and registration of new and returning students will be from noon until 8 p.m. June 12.

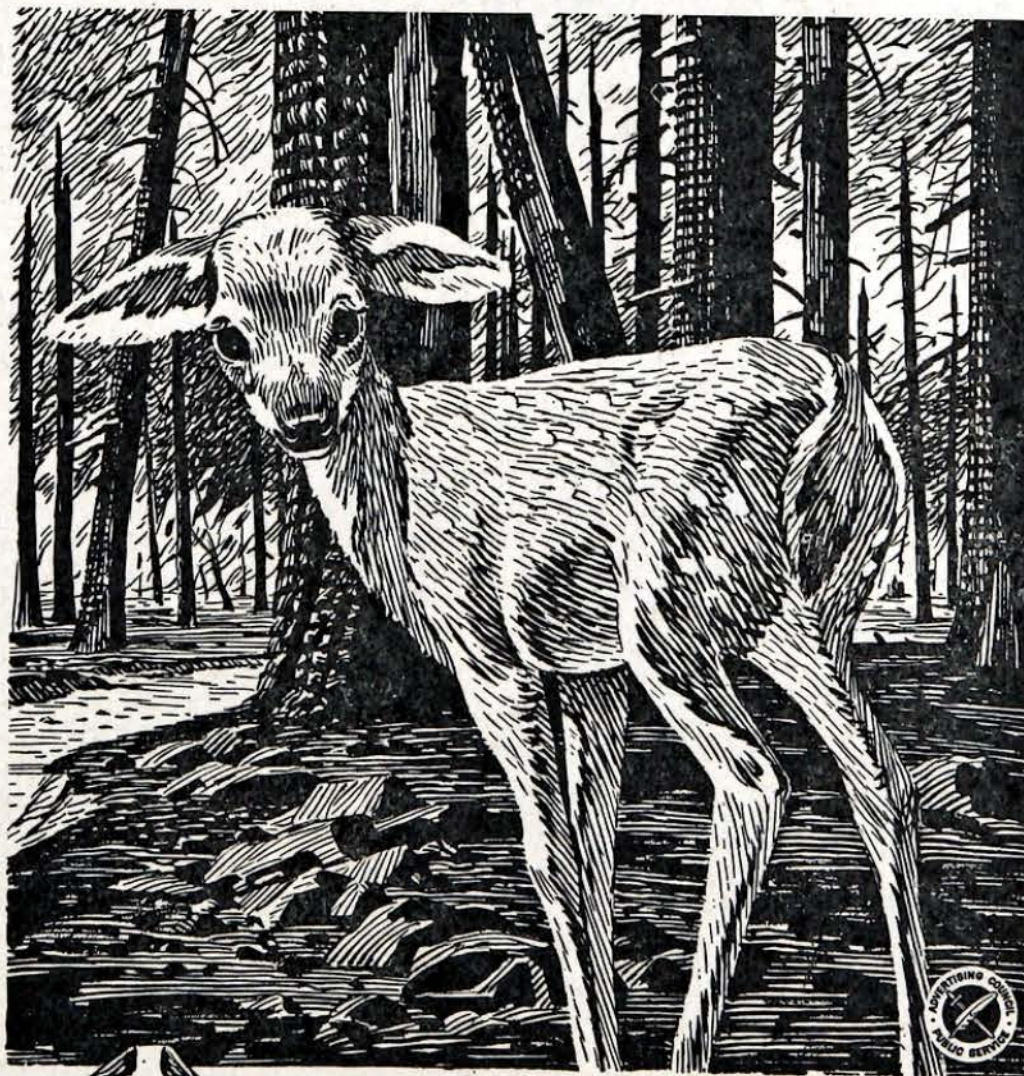

Dr. Rohde Leaves \$500,000 To University

Heinrich Rohde of Sebring, a pioneer in the Florida citrus industry and benefactor of the University of Tampa, has bequeathed the majority of his estate in the amount of more than \$500,000 to the University, Dr. David M. Delo, president of the college has announced.

In making the announcement of the bequest, Dr. Delo, said, "The generous bequest by Dr. Heinrich Rohde marks the first really major bequest to the University of Tampa since its founding in 1931. We are extremely grateful to Dr. Rohde for this concrete evidence of his great faith in the future of the University. With his action as an example, I hope that other individuals will similarly express their confidence in the University and the private enterprise system which has made our American society unique."

A native of Berlin who came to this country in 1910, Dr. Rohde sent thousands of food and clothing parcels to West Germany to help the starving people there immediately following World War II. In recognition of this work and for his financial assistance to deserving persons in this country as well, the University of Tampa conferred upon him the honorary degree of

Doctor of Humane Letters in the spring of 1963. The philanthropist became interested in the University after World War I and has become one of its staunchest supporters.

Dr. Rohde has maintained large citrus groves in the Sebring and Fort Pierce areas, having bought his first grove land in Sebring in 1921.

Dr. Croneis To Speak At Commencement

Dr. Carey Croneis, Chancellor of Rice University, Houston, Texas, will address the graduating class at Commencement Exercises at the Falk Theater, Sunday, June 7, at 3:00 p.m.

Dr. Croneis, a noted geologist, was Provost of Rice before becoming its Chancellor. Before coming to Rice, Dr. Croneis was President of Beloit College, Wisconsin, from 1944 to 1954. At that time he joined the staff at Rice University.

Receiving his B.S. from Denison University in 1922, he went on to the University of Kansas where he was awarded his M.S., then to Harvard for his Ph.D. in 1928. Dr. Croneis also holds honorary degrees from several other universities. His background includes teaching of geology at the University of Kansas, University of Arkansas, Harvard, Wellesley and the University of Chicago.

In addition to his university work Dr. Croneis designed the geology section of the Museum of Science and Industry in Chicago, where he

was formerly in charge of its geology section and the chief of basic sciences.

As an author he has written "Paleozoic Geology of Arkansas," and was the co-author of "Down to Earth." Dr. Croneis also has written numerous articles for scientific journals.

New Refund Policy For 64, 65

In the event a student withdraws from the University within two weeks after classes begin, a fifty percent (50%) refund of tuition will be granted. No refund of any other fees will be made.

The final date for this refund is noted in the calendar included in the University catalog. After the last day designated in the calendar, no University fees or charges, except for board, will be refunded. The charge for board will be prorated as outlined in the following paragraph.

The board proration will apply only to the cost of foodstuffs and not to all other necessary food services expenses.

his full-time course work and extends over a 10-year period. If a borrower becomes a full-time teacher in a public elementary or secondary school, a maximum of 50 per cent of the loan, plus interest, may be cancelled at the rate of 10 per cent for each year of teaching.

Persons wishing to be considered for one of these federal loans should get in touch with Dr. Robert E. Wean, chairman of the Student Aid Committee, University of Tampa, as soon as possible.

The University also recently received a \$9,000 student loan fund grant from the state of Florida for the 1964-65 academic year to be made available to persons who have been legal residents of Florida for at least the past three years.

Administered by the Florida Student Scholarship and Loan Commission and the State Department of Education, the fund will be available to students of the University of Tampa or those who will enter the University this fall. The maximum amount which may be borrowed in any year is the amount of the tuition and registration fees at the University, with a limit of \$1,000 to any one student. The University will recommend students for loans on the basis of ability and need, and funds will usually be allocated for a full academic year. Students awarded these loans must maintain a "C" average, and application should be made with the Student Aid Committee.

Money loaned must be repaid at an interest rate of 4 per cent annually beginning no later than July 1 of the year following graduation or termination of college attendance.

The University of Tampa also has other student loan funds available for the 1964-65 academic year which have been contributed by various individuals and other organizations.

The Roscoe H. Ellis Memorial Fund of \$30,000 and the Harry Wilderman Loan Fund of 7,500 make loans available to students who have completed at least one semester at the University of Tampa with satisfactory grades. Preference is given to juniors and seniors.

Under the Ellis Fund, a student may borrow a sum within the limits established by the Student Aid Committee. The amount of aid under the Wilderman Fund is not to exceed \$250 during a student's entire course at the University. Repayment on both must begin within four months after the student leaves the college at a 6 per cent simple interest maximum.

Other student loan funds available for the 1964-65 year were contributed by Walter S. Pierce in the amount of \$14,200, Mutual Finance Company of Tampa, W. C. Tinsley, president, \$1,000; Scottish Rite Bodies of Tampa, \$1,000;

Dormitory Experiment

Rochester, N.Y. — (I.P.) — An experiment in undergraduate living centers has been initiated at the "Towers," the University of Rochester's new residence complex. Aim of the new living center for juniors and seniors is to provide upperclassmen with a transitional experience in preparation for after-college living.

As a result, the facilities of the "Towers" resemble those of an adult apartment house more closely than the usual college dormitory. For example, the traditional dormitory arrangement — individual bedrooms opening on a long corridor — has been replaced by apartment-like suites. A typical suite for six students consists of a compact living room, single and bedrooms for double occupants, bath facilities, and built-in storage areas.

Unlike the University's other residence halls, the "Towers" is co-educational. Currently coeds live on seven floors of the Center and men occupy eleven floors. Residence in the "Towers" is open only to junior and senior students and is, of course, entirely voluntary. A number of faculty families also live in the Towers.

Present "Towers" occupants participated actively in the various stages of planning and have worked out many of their own house rules — including strict standards of dress in the University's first carpeted dining center.

To date residents have voiced enthusiastic approval of the project. Students are enjoying the op-

portunity to entertain fellow students, faculty members, and campus visitors in their "apartments;" a number of special social and cultural events open to both student and faculty residents have been held; and some of the University's Honors Program seminars have met in the suites.

While acknowledging that the new center is an experiment, Joseph W. Cole, University Dean of Student Affairs, notes that "at the University in all areas of our program, we seek to work closely with students in helping them to acquire a sense of purpose and a value system that serves as a basis for intelligent living. We hope," he adds, "that the Towers ultimately will be judged as contributing to this end."

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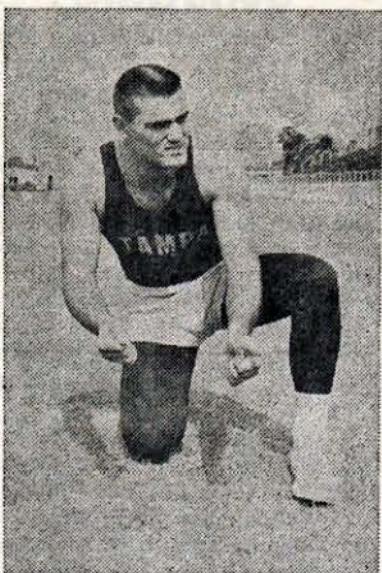
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Two U of T Wrestlers Go To Olympics
