STUDENT OPINION POLLS TO OPEN SOON

Dean Reports 921 Are Now Enrolled

Enrollment this semester at the University of Tampa is 921, the office of Mrs. Sylvia Harbert, registrar, reports. Of this number 631 aree men and 290 women, the former sonstituting 68.5 of the total.

Tampans number, 653, and 132 students from other parts of the state bring Florida's total to 785. The remaining 136 students come from 25 other states and several foreign countries, Ohio leading the out-of-state groups with 24, Pennsylvania being second with 21, and New York being third with 16.

Of the 921 students enrolled, 310, or 33 per cent, are veterans.

The figures given do not include enrollment in the Adult Education Center.


ATTENTION GIRLS! Fla. State Sports Day - April 5th

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
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Alpha Gamma To Give Away A Dog


